

USDA-NRCS Different than most federal agencies

- Farm Bill funding to address farmers/ranchers resource concerns through incentive programs and easements.
- Voluntary participation in all Programs
- Free planning
- Competitive funding for eligible producers when reimbursable contracts are completed to specifications
- All interactions, plans, and contracts with clients are private as stated in policy and FB statutes
- Focus on private lands with some public lands eligible, except for easements

Farmers & Ranchers Resource Concerns

- Water Quantity
- Erosion Control and Drainage Control
- Water Quality
- Vegetation Management
- Wildlife Habitat Improvements
 - NRCS CA has always had multiple fund pools for targeted at-risk wildlife species


Planning


- Landowner Conservation Plan
- Works best with goals that address client's resource concerns and target species resource concerns
- Steps:
 - Assess existing Resource Concerns
 - Proposed alternatives to address Resource Concerns
 - Alternatives developed that benefit target species habitat without adverse effects.

WLFW – SWFL Coordination with FWS

- Selection of SWFL as one of the original seven WLFW Species
- Developed a SWFL Habitat Evaluation Guide in coordination with USFWS
- Consultation Process with USFW in 2012 and 2015

WLFW Approach for SWFL & LBVI

- Targeted approach near historic or extant territories
- Using habitat suitability models and science provided by USGS to prioritize areas
- Enhancing riparian habitat with partners
- Increase nesting habitat and connectivity through invasive species management

Potential opportunities to work on Habitat for SWFL and LBVI

- Expand NRCS technical assistance in Southern CA with Partner Biologist positions with ABC, FWS, DOD, and others
- Increase the joint funding for riparian habitat enhancement occurring with the FWS Partners Program
- Secure matching funding for riparian restoration projects or ag easements through REPI
- Coordinate with interested federal, state and local partners

Producer Disincentives for contracting riparian restoration

- No benefit to farm or ranch sustainability
- Potential for permits or consultations
- Reduced funding for eligible applicants with maximum payment limitations in Farm Bill
- State law fee requirements
 - Lake/streambed 1600 permit minimum \$6,000
 - Incidental Take permit fee minimum \$6,000
